She was intrigued by the region and the delicate relationship between law and religion, and therefore sought to further her career in Middle Eastern family law. After having completed a BA in Arabic languages and cultures at the Faculty of Humanities, Leiden University, in 2006, she embarked on her PhD project 'Family Law in Syria' at the Leiden University Institute for Area Studies in 2007. Her research interests and expertise include Middle Eastern law, Islamic family law, legal anthropology, gender and human rights issues, both in the academia and beyond.
