## Curriculum Vitae

Martti Veldi was born in 1981 in Tartu, Estonia. After graduating from Tartu Miina Härma Gümnaasium in 2000 he started studying history and archaeology at the University of Tartu. Veldi obtained both, his BA (2004) and MA (2009) degrees from the Chair of Archaeology, Department of History, University of Tartu. His MA thesis *Centres and Communication in South-Eastern Estonia during the Iron Age in the context of Early Modern Era maps* explored the opportunities of interpreting Iron Age communication combining 17th century maps and data on archaeological sites.
