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Stratum corneum hydration : mode of action of moisturizers on a molecular level

STRATUM CORNEUM HYDRATION

MODE OF ACTION OF MOISTURIZERS ON A MOLECULAR LEVEL

1. The cells in the central region of the stratum corneum are most susceptible to changes in water levels. (*this thesis*)
2. Due to its hexagonal lipid packing, porcine stratum corneum is not a suitable model of human stratum corneum for permeability studies. (*this thesis*)
3. The addition of large quantities of lipophilic moisturizers does not necessarily decrease the long periodicity phase or the orthorhombic packing in the stratum corneum lipid matrix. (*this thesis*)
4. The incorporation of small quantities of non-occlusive lipophilic moisturizers into the stratum corneum lipid domains may explain the effect of this type of moisturizers on the hydration of the skin. (*this thesis*)
5. With new ceramides being discovered, the numbering of ceramides according to their lipophilicity is no longer practical. It is therefore high time that ceramides were referred to by the nomenclature introduced by Motta et al. in 1993. (*S. Motta et al., Biochimica et Biophysica, 1993, p. 147-151*)
6. The permeability-barrier abnormality in atopic dermatitis is not merely an epiphenomenon but rather the “driver” of disease activity. (*P.M. Elias, Journal of Investigative Dermatology 2008 (128), p. 1067-1070*)
7. Endogenous glycerol plays a role in skin hydration. (*J.W. Fluhr et al., British Journal of Dermatology, 2008, p 23-34*)
8.
