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STELLINGEN BIJ HET PROEFSCHRIFT 'IMPACT AND BENEFITS OF EARLY HEARING SCREENING'

- 1. A pass at newborn hearing screening does not guarantee normal hearing in childhood (this thesis).
- 2. The development of children with permanent childhood hearing impairment at the age of 3-5 years is better when screened by newborn hearing screening than distraction hearing screening (this thesis).
- 3. Insight into the cause of hearing impairment is essential when evaluating the development of a child with permanent hearing impairment (this thesis).
- 4. The possibility of congenital cytomegalovirus infection should be explored in every child with permanent childhood hearing impairment (this thesis).
- 5. Early identification of hearing impairment is unlikely to result in improved developmental outcomes if it is not followed by early intervention (Yoshinaga-Itano, Pediatrics 1998 Nov;102(5):1161-71).
- 6. Plasticity of the central auditory system is crucial for the success of interventions in children with hearing impairment (Sharma, Neuroreport 2002 Jul 19;13(10):1365-8).
- 7. The euphemism 'refer' in hearing screening programs was adopted to characterize a failed hearing screening test and minimize parental anxiety (Morton, N Engl J Med. 2006 May 18;354(20):2151-64).
- 8. Randomized trials will almost always be necessary to show whether the hoped for benefit of a medical intervention exists (Vandenbroucke, Lancet 2009 Apr 11;373(9671):1233-5).
