Judeans in Babylonia

- 1. Judeans and other deportees were primarily resettled in the Babylonian countryside in order to increase agricultural output and tax revenue.
- 2. Although the majority of deportees tilled land in the countryside, some merchants and officials enjoyed a higher standard of living.
- 3. The Babylonian policy of resettling deportees in rural communities according to their ethnic origin helped the deportees nurture their own culture.
- 4. Studies of Near Eastern history should better acknowledge population diversity in ancient societies.
- 5. The Hebrew Bible sheds light on the exilic experience and its theological reflections, not on life in Babylonia.

- 6. The alleged return migration from Babylonia to Judah (cf. the books of Ezra and Nehemiah) has to be examined within the parameters of Judean life in Babylonia.
- 7. The present thesis provides an example of a research topic which benefits from interdisciplinary collaboration between Assyriology and biblical studies.
- 8. Teamwork and collaborative projects advance research in humanities, but this potential has not been fully realised.
- 9. Migration is an age-old phenomenon and an essential part of human existence.
- 10. Writing a history shows how things could have been, hiking in the wilderness shows how things are.
- 11. The author's four-year exile by the canals of Leiden demonstrates that living in a foreign land is an awarding and demanding experience.
