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Propositions

- 1. Humans possess knowledge of languages they do not speak.
- 2. General properties of human cognition excluding hierarchic structure building and lexical categories cannot exclusively account for word order preferences.
- 3. Hierarchic structure building and lexical categories are not enough to account for all word order preferences.
- 4. Verb clusters are great for lazy people; they don't have to move around anything.
- 5. There can be degrees of grammaticality.
- 6. Language variation is structured.
- 7. The distribution of syntactic properties across language varieties is indicative of properties of grammars.
- 8. The 3-1-2 order is different from the 1-2-3 order. A verb cluster with a 1-2-3 order is a typical Dutch verb cluster. Therefore, a cluster with a 3-1-2 order is different from a typical Dutch verb cluster.
- 9. Sentences that cannot be derived in syntax can nevertheless receive a prosodic and semantic interpretation.
- 10. It will take a few more years until models of language processing are precise enough to make testable predictions on word order preferences.
- 11. Some restrictions on language variation are universal to human language.
- 12. Belgium has its own language. It has several. (This is directed at John Stewart.)
