## Currencies

1 fanum/panam = 7 ½ stuivers

1 rijckdalder/ rixdollar = 8 fanums/ 60 stuivers

1 heavy Persian abacy = 3 1/8 fanums/ 23 7/16 stuivers

1 light abacy =  $2^{1/2}$  fanums/  $18 \frac{5}{8}$  stuivers

1 Surat rupee =  $4 \frac{1}{16} \frac{fanums}{30 \frac{11}{32} stuivers}$ 

## Weights

1 *para* = 40 Dutch Pounds

75 para = 1 last/ 3,000 Dutch Pounds

1 *khandil/candy* = 500 Dutch Pounds
