## Boban Arsenijević

- 1. Telicity is a decompositional notion: a telic eventuality consists of two concatenated atelic eventualities.
- 2. Predicates of atelic eventualities have mass reference, while those of telic eventualities involve a phase transition, which gives them countable reference.
- 3. Inner aspect is a quantificational, or mereological, notion, dividing eventualities into homogeneous and non-homogeneous ones. In order to be non-homogeneous, an eventuality needs to be quantified.
- 4. Only countable (i.e. telic) eventualities can be quantified (i.e. non-homogeneous).
- 5. The Verb Phrase and the Noun Phrase use the same structure at the syntax-semantics interface; the distinctive property of verbal expressions is that they involve temporal predicates in the positions where other categories have predicates of other kinds.
- 6. Cumulativity and divisiveness can be viewed as mereological counterparts of the set-theoretic notions of downward and upward entailment.
- 7. The last distinction that will keep alive the notions of foreigners and "homelanders" resides in their way of nagging about the very same things.
- 8. Fortune is a meteopathic lady.
- 9. Grammaticality judgments and other intuitions of speakers of a language in linguistic research is yet another fruitful context for the interpretation of the mediaeval alchemist motto known as VITRIOL:

Visita Interiora Terrae Rectificando Invenies Occultum Lapidem. ('Visit the interior of the earth and rectifying/purifying you will find the hidden/secret stone.')
