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## Stellingen

- 1. The concept of 'Community Archaeology' is misleading in its scope and is best replaced by 'Participatory Archaeology'. (Contra Moser et al. 2002)
- 2. Monte Negro's Early Ramos phase monumental architecture reflects the unity of religious and political lordship in the Mixteca Alta as depicted in the Late Natividad phase pictorial manuscripts.
- 3. Participatory archaeology not only makes an effort to seek collaboration with local community members, but indeed depends on it.
- 4. Monumental landscape features, rather than monumental architecture, underscore the regional authority of the Apoala Valley as described in pictorial and ethnohistorical sources.
- 5. Kent Flannery (University of Michigan) is to be credited for initiating the reflexive method in Mesoamerican archaeology, by introducing the R.M.A. ('Real Mesoamerican Archaeologist') and the S.G.S ('Skeptical Graduate Student').
- 6. Archaeology is a rational academic activity that can be applied in contemporary societal contexts. Paradoxically, in the majority of cases archaeology is perceived by these contexts as lacking purpose.
- 7. In archaeological surface surveying you can sometimes pick up more by picking up less.
- 8. For the disciplinary development of archaeology, postcolonial discourse is a paradigmatic means, not a discursive end.
- 9. The teaching program at the Faculty of Archaeology of Leiden University would benefit from a course in archaeological ethics.
- 10. Solving a problem does not always bring more peace of mind than struggling with it.
