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CURRICULUM VITAE

Pieter Houten (Gronsveld, 1984) studied Veterinarian Medicine at Utrecht University from 2003 to 2008. In 2008 he started the BA History at the same university. In 2011 he obtained the bachelor degree in History with a minor in Ancient Culture. Subsequently he registered for the research master Ancient Studies at Utrecht University. As part of this programme he spent a semester at Universidad Complutense de Madrid, where he studied at the faculties Ciencias Políticas y Sociología and Geografía e Historia. During this stay he started his master thesis on Celtiberian urbanization in pre-Roman and Roman times. A Philologisch Studiefonds travel grant created the possibility to visit different Celtiberian sites, among others *Numantia*, *Termes* and *Clunia*. He obtained his research master degree in 2013.

In the same year he started with his PhD within the ERC-funded research project 'An Empire of 2000 Cities'. In this project he focussed on Roman urbanism on the Iberian Peninsula during the High Empire.

Between 2011 and 2016 he took part in various archaeological excavations. His first experience in this field was gained in 2011 and 2012 during an archaeological internship in the Netherlands. In 2012 he participated in the excavation at Thorikos carried out by Utrecht University. While working on his PhD thesis he took part in several geophysical prospection campaigns in Boeotia. In addition, he joined two field schools focussing on Roman cities in Spain, in 2015 the TOLETUM Field School in *Segobriga* and in 2016 a course focussing on *Iesso*, present-day Guissona.

During his PhD research period he started teaching Ancient History at Leiden University. Since September 2017 he has been working as an Academic Skills Teacher at Leiden University. In 2018 he became University Teacher at Utrecht University and worked as Coordinator of Studies for the Research Master History at Leiden University.
