Thomas Mareite was born in Chartres, France on 11 November 1992. In 2013, he graduated with a bachelor degree, at the Collège Universitaire of Sciences Po Paris, with a *cum laude*. As part of his undergraduate education, he studied at the Universidad Diego Portales, in Santiago de Chile, for one academic year. In 2015, he graduated with a Master of Research in History at the Ecole Doctorale of Sciences Po Paris. His master thesis, "Africains et Afrodescendants du Chili: Esclavage, Conflictualités, Emancipations (1750-1850)", was supervised by Professor Dr. Roberto Zaugg (University of Zurich). In October 2015, Thomas Mareite started his PhD at Leiden University, as part of the NWO-funded project "Beacons of Freedom: Slave Refugees in North America, 1800-1860". His dissertation, *Conditional Freedom: Free Soil and Fugitive Slaves from the US South to Mexico's Northeast, 1803-1861*, was conducted under the direction of Professor Dr. Damian A. Pargas and the co-direction of Professor Dr. Marlou Schrover.
