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## Propositions

1. Natorp's project of a general psychology argues that lived-experience is a necessary condition for knowledge-production and knowledge acquisition.
2. The neo-Kantian notion of lived-experience is a systematic reflective model, the purpose of which is to identify and describe a priori subjective conditions of recognition and evaluation of objective validity.
3. Neo-Kantian psychology identifies three main epistemic moments that are necessary for the subjective acquisition and recognition of objective knowledge: sensory consciousness, representational consciousness, and conceptual consciousness.
4. Natorp's general psychology lays the foundation for an action-oriented epistemology of knowledge acquisition and objective understanding.
5. Natorp's general psychology differs from genetic phenomenology because it focuses on the question concerning a priori conditions of objective validity.
6. General psychology does not aim at explaining the origin of knowledge but the a priori structure of concrete awareness of objective validity, that is, it explains how it feels to objectively know the world.
7. General psychology is a philosophical antecedent of contemporary conceptualism of perception.
8. General psychology and social pedagogy are complementary projects, oriented towards a systematic definition of a priori subjective conditions to knowledge formation and acquisition.
9. Objective knowledge is the art of turning what is known into unexpected questions.
10. Science and every form of what we may call knowledge of the world relies on the silent commitment to an impossible transcendence.
11. Creativity and reflexivity are the quintessence of scientific understanding.
