

## Cupid on a leash: sexual codes of conduct in Renaissance Italy, 1450-1550

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## Propositions

- 1. Sexual codes of conduct in Renaissance Italy cannot be properly understood without considering perceptions of sexual nature.
- 2. In Italy between c. 1450-1550, most beliefs about sexual nature were a reflection of male (upper-class) interests.
- 3. The impact of gender hierarchy on sexual codes of conduct for men and women in Renaissance Italy cannot be overestimated.
- 4. With regard to matters of sexuality, the amount of leeway that any individual was permitted in Italy between c. 1450-1550, strongly depended on gender, age, social class and sexual orientations.
- 5. When studying the history of sexuality, one should think in terms of contradictory codes of conduct rather than in terms of an opposition between normative behavior and sexual deviancy.
- 6. When looking at the past, researchers should note that the existence of many different, often contradictory codes of conduct could be both liberating and restrictive.
- 7. Using a wide variety of sources is the only way to examine how broadly a particular code of conduct was shared in the past.
- 8. Contrary to what Jacqueline Murray and Nicholas Terpstra have claimed, monographs that offer generalized conclusions relating to sex, gender and sexuality in Renaissance Italy are a vital means for the dissemination of research, even at this point in the evolution of the history of sexuality.
