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## POSTPARTUM HEMORRHAGE

## From Insight to Action

- There is wide variation between high-resource settings in the incidence and management of severe postpartum hemorrhage leading to massive transfusion; evidence-based and uniform management guidelines are needed. (This thesis)
- 2. Rotational fibrin-based thromboelastometry could not serve as an early point-of-care parameter to predict progression of bleeding when routinely taken between 800 and 1500mL of blood loss following childbirth. (This thesis)
- 3. Propensity score matching is an appropriate statistical method to compare the effect of different obstetric interventions within observational cohort studies on persistent postpartum hemorrhage. (*This thesis*)
- 4. The potential room for improvement makes postpartum hemorrhage an important target for continuous efforts to improve maternal outcome; we are morally obliged to draw qualitative lessons from maternal deaths. (This thesis)
- A uniform and composite definition of severe postpartum hemorrhage is essential to evaluate and compare the results of studies across different settings and over time.
- 6. More reliable point-of-care viscoelastic hemostatic assays are needed to guide or withhold blood products during the course of ongoing postpartum hemorrhage.
- 7. Technology drives healthcare; innovative projects with integration of the medical and technological fields will lead to the innovation and optimization of obstetric intervention to stop bleeding.
- 8. Routine and systematic collection of data on severe postpartum hemorrhage may help to establish confidential audits of maternal near miss and maternal mortality cases in a recurrent manner in order to improve the quality of maternity care.
- 9. Give blood for those who give life. (WHO, 2014) access to safe blood to manage pregnancy- and childbirth-related complications should be part of maternity care.
- 10. In the end it is not only about finding balance in your propensity score model, but also about finding balance in your life. (*Camila Caram-Deelder*, 2018) maintaining a work-life balance is essential during your PhD.
- 11. You miss 100 percent of the shots you don't take. (*Michael Jordan*, 1992) You can't succeed unless you try.
