Curriculum Vitae

Eline Scheerlinck was born in Gent on January 9, 1986. She completed a BA (2005) and MA (2008) in Linguistics and Literature: Latin and Greek at Ghent University, with specializations in Italian language and culture, and in the study of material texts such as papyri and inscriptions.
