Dissertation: Mutable Audible – An Operative Ontology of the Sound Image

- The sound image is a temporal operation that enables a listening agent and its milieu to enter into

a metastable relationship.

- The sound image is a tool to address the fundamental mutability of the audible.

- Every constitution of a sound image entails the constitution of a particular audibility. Different

audibilities entail different forms of engaging with the world.

- The sound image cannot exist beyond the technical configuration in which it is produced.

Listening is always *learning* to listen. Art can assume as its purpose to explore and stimulate the way

in which this learning takes place.

- Music deals with listening operations; it is inappropriate to address it as an art *about* consolidated

entities or notions.

- Once the general notion of image is expanded to embrace the realm of the sonorous, it is

transformed; it therefore concerns the formation of the sensorial beyond a visual-centric model.

- Imagination exceeds the private domain of the mind; it concerns forms of vital participation in the

world.

- The institutional field of music would gain a lot from abandoning its unfaltering habit of venerating

past assumptions of what musical practice and musical listening is.

- Music festivals need to overhaul their foundations and turn into community building events

exploring the relationship between sound making, knowledge-production and the values that

inform an engagement with reality.

Artistic research can grow further as a practice if it embraces the dissolution of the boundaries of

that which is considered art.
