

Essays on legislative decision-making in the European Union Pourebrahimi Andouhjerdi, A.

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Propositions:

- 1. Politicization within the European Union (EU) is reflected in the voting behavior of member states in the Council of the EU (Council).
- 2. Governments holding extreme policy positions are more likely to contest legislative decisions in the Council.
- 3. The culture of consensus within the Council leads member states to adjust their positions to consider minority views, even when their votes are not essential for the approval of a legislative act.
- 4. The culture of consensus in the Council prolongs negotiations on legislative acts.
- 5. Net contributor member states to the EU budget are more inclined to contest legislative decisions in the Council.
- 6. Under the Qualified Majority Voting system, voting alignment is positively correlated with differences in voting power among member states.
- 7. There is no evidence of a cleavage between older and newer member states in voting alignment within the Council.
- 8. Governments with divergent positions on EU integration demonstrate lower voting alignment in the Council.
- 9. Domestic public opinion on the EU is correlated with the voting behavior of member states in the Council.
- 10. Member states with more similar policy positions exhibit higher voting alignment with one another.
