Propositions

- 1. Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing (DHH) children face intrinsic and extrinsic challenges and opportunities that impact their social participation (this thesis)
- 2. Incidental learning opportunities occur every day, however accessing them can be more challenging for many DHH children (this thesis).
- 3. Social emotions, in this case empathy and moral emotions, are crucial for maintaining social relationships (this thesis).
- 4. The physical-social environment needs to be taken into consideration when addressing social participation of DHH children (this thesis).
- 5. Hearing children's lack of awareness on how to communicate with a DHH child can form a barrier for DHH children social participation (related to the research field).
- 6. Early and bilateral intervention can positively contribute to access of DHH preschoolers' access to the social world (related to the research field).
- 7. Despite neglected, physical play is important for DHH children (related to the research field).
- 8. Play is a fundamental right for all children, including children who come from poor backgrounds, children with disabilities, and children from minority groups (related to the research field).
- 9. Research focused on disability needs to evolve towards a more mindful approach that includes people's lived experiences (societal subject).
- 10. It is quite amazing how doing a PhD can change our views about the world (societal subject).
