Giacomo Boffi was born in Lodi, Italy, in 1996. He pursued his pre-university education in Lodi and subsequently obtained a Bachelor's degree (BSc) in Politics & Economics cum laude from the University of Milan in 2018. Following this, he earned a Master of Science (MSc) in Economic Policy from Utrecht University in 2019.

In 2020, Giacomo began his PhD on the Economics & Governance of Migration at the Department of Economics of Leiden University's Law School and at Leiden University College, under the supervision of Prof. Dr. Olaf van Vliet and Dr. Eduard Suari-Andreu. His research consisted of empirical analyses of migrant socio-economic integration in high-income countries, and it was conducted as part of the Social Citizenship and Migration research programme at Leiden University, as well as the Leiden-Delft-Erasmus Centre on Governance of Migration and Diversity. His PhD training included courses and summer schools in the Netherlands (e.g., Tinbergen Institute) and abroad (e.g., Paris School of Economics, Istituto ISEO). During his PhD, Giacomo contributed to the teaching activities of the Department of Economics, specifically in courses such as Principles of Economics and Comparative Political Economy. In 2022, Giacomo collaborated with the International Migration Division of the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) in Paris, contributing to a chapter of the 2022 International Migration Review.
