## CURRICULUM VITAE

Tessa Willemina Maria de Boer was born in Heemskerk, the Netherlands on 7 October 1997. She attended the Gymnasium Felisenum from 2009 to 2015. She obtained her BA (2018, *cum laude*) and Research MA (2020, *cum laude*) in History at Leiden University. During her studies, she spent a semester at University College London, interned at the Amsterdam City Archives and the Stadhuismuseum Zierikzee, and won the 2021 Johan de Witt thesis prize for the best Master's thesis on the Dutch Republic. Between September 2020 and July 2024, she conducted her PhD at her *alma mater* Leiden University. Alongside presenting and publishing in scientific and public outlets in the Netherlands and internationally, she served as chair of the PhD Council, lectured in the History BA, and completed the N.W. Posthumus graduate training. She also conducted various side projects and organized different events, supported by grants of (among others) the Leids Universiteits Fonds, the N.W. Posthumus Institute, and the Leiden University Centre for Digital Humanities. Throughout, she continued to work as a data curator for the *Alle Amsterdamse Akten*-project of the Amsterdam City Archives, and serves as editorial secretary of the *Tijdschrift voor Zeegeschiedenis*. Since August 2024, she has worked fulltime as a programme/policy officer at the Social Sciences & Humanities domain of the Dutch Research Council (NWO) in The Hague.
