PREFACE

This dissertation that gathers and analyses ancient Egyptian (predominantly demotic) marriage documents, comes 65 years after the foundational works of P. W. Pestman and E. Lüddeckens on this topic. A new review of these documents was long overdue, since the text materials available for study have since almost doubled, and the study of demotic legal documents and clauses has advanced significantly. In addition, this work endeavours to provide a new general theory on Egyptian family practices of marriage, inheritance and household structure, in light of Eurasian historical family traditions. In this respect too, it builds on the works of P. W. Pestman, whose studies of Egyptian family practices through legal documents provided the starting point for the views and re-views in this study.

Bilateral (cognatic):	Through both the male (or father's) line and the female (or mother's) line.
Cognatic:	See <i>bilateral</i> .

Its domestic cycle creates nuclear, stem and joint household formations.
Kin:	One's family and relations.
Lineal:	A vertical connection or mode of transmission.
Lineage:	A lineal descent line from one or more ancestors.
Partible inheritance:	An inheritance tradition in which property and assets are divided among heirs – property is passed on to the next generation in separate shares for separate heirs.
Patrilineal:	A mode of transmission from father to child, often father to son.
Patrilocal:	Residence of a married couple in the house or household of the husband and his parents; also used for wives moving in with their husbands after marriage (for this use, see p. 259 fn. 1248, <i>infra</i>).
Matrilineal:	A mode of transmission from mother to child.
Matrilocal:	Residence of a married couple in the house or household of the wife and her parents; also used for husbands moving in with their wives after marriage (for this use, see p. 259 fn. 1248, <i>infra</i>).
Nuclear family:	A family system in which no children remain connected to the parental household after marriage, in which households do not survive past the lifetimes of their founders and only contain one conjugal unit at a time.
Stem family:	A family system in which one child remains connected to the parental household after marriage, resulting in households that contains two conjugal units in different generations concurrently. Its domestic cycle creates nuclear and stem household formations.

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Overview tables of marriage document formats

This section contains a tabular overview of the distinct types of marriage documents, their contractual format and their legal clauses. This classification follows Pestman's ABC-typology of marriage texts, with emendations that allow for the inclusion of texts that I classify as ABC+ or 'mixed' texts. The overall typology of marriage documents and the legal clauses that are presented within them are the topic of discussion in Chapter 2.

The tables below are based on the marriage documents that are currently available and do not offer a representative view of which types of marriage documents were most commonly used or most 'popular'. Documents from Middle Egypt are underrepresented in the corpus.

The following restrictions apply to the tables:

1. The tables list the most common and longest known version of legal clauses and subclauses. Marriage texts may show smaller or larger variation in standard legal clauses. I have tried to include notable variants where possible.
2. The tables include only texts from the Ptolemaic and Roman periods, the times in which the formats for marriage documents were most fully developed. While pre-Ptolemaic texts show some clauses similar to those of documents from the Ptolemaic period, they are usually significantly shorter, or have completely different formats all together (e.g., the abnormal hieratic texts **146–149**). In the Database these texts are indicated as ('Pestman type, pre-Ptolemaic', e.g. 'Type A, pre-Ptolemaic').
3. The sequence of the clauses in the table does not (always) reflect the sequence of clauses in the actual documents, which is variable in the preserved examples.

Notes to the tables

Demotic marriage documents start with a dating formula and a clause naming the contractual parties and their respective fathers and mothers. These are omitted from the tables; the Database of Texts includes the clause naming the contractual parties, but not the dating formulae. Marriage documents usually ended with the name and title(s) of the scribe who wrote the document; a witness list was usually included. Texts could further include signatures and subscriptions. These are all omitted from the Database of Texts and from the tables below.

A consent clause could optionally be added to any type of marriage document. These clauses are omitted from the tables.¹ The optional stock phrases *n ḥtr iwt mn/ iwt sh nb* at the end of various legal clauses are also omitted.²

Transcriptions have been normalised to keep the tables readable. Transcriptions with indications of damage, lacunae, and emendations, as well as notes on transcriptions and translations, can be found in the Database of Texts under the text entries.

{ } brackets indicate optional elements or subsections in a clause. A place name + text number e.g. Thebes(**73**) indicates that a clause or variant occurs in that text in particular and not in all texts from that specific place.

From Hermopolis there is also evidence that documents of type C were in use. Type C *s^cnh*-contracts are mentioned in *P. Mattha recto*, and a type C contract made by a man for his mother comes from this city (p. 29 fn. 138, p. 157 fn. 642).

The Akhmim format is notable in that it does not start with an initial marriage payment of any kind. The divorce clauses, most similar to those of type A texts, suggest that a *šp n s.ḥm.t* may have been the initial marriage payment, therefore I have classified these texts as type A+. Pestman sorted these texts under his type A.
