When Dionysus Lands on Erin

Greek Tragedy on Irish Grounds

- 1. Seamus Heaney is mostly known as a poet rather than a playwright, yet it was the powerful reconciliatory message conveyed through *The Cure at Troy* that helped solidify his standing as a Nobel laureate.
- 2. Tom Paulin's steadfastness regarding the unflinching moral triumph of Antigone in *The Riot Act* mirrors Creon's black-and-white disposition more closely than he might have imagined.
- 3. Although *By the Bog of Cats* departs the most from the adaptations discussed in the thesis, Hester Swane embodies the mythical qualities that render her the closest to a Greek tragedy heroine.
- 4. While *The Riot Act* and *The Cure at Troy* allude to Ireland's political partition, it is *By the Bog* that reflects a deeper, integral divide: that of Ireland's sense of self.
- 5. The plays analysed in this thesis reflect a triptych of violence and justice known to Ireland: Antigone endures violence for a cause she deems just, Medea inflicts violence as retaliation for her unjust treatment, while Philoctetes harbours violence within himself as a justified means of protest.
- 6. W.B. Yeats spurs as much as he haunts the Irish creative imagination.
- 7. It is the appropriation of the Greek component in the plays under scrutiny that enables them to come across as acutely Irish.
- 8. Classical Reception Studies showcase that the past is as indeterminate and malleable as an Irish bog.
- 9. Classical Reception has saved and continues to save Classics from oblivion, since the times of Classical antiquity.
- 10. As Classical Reception Studies gain popularity, there is a risk of establishing a restrictive methodology for approaching postclassical cultural objects, potentially limiting their interdisciplinary reach and excluding alternative interpretations of classical texts and ideas.
- 11. If theatre still matters today in a way somewhat comparable to how it mattered politically and socially in ancient Greece, then Ireland offers the closest example of that experience.
- 12. Writing a PhD thesis is a mental preparation for the bureaucracy that lies ahead of defending it.
