Curriculum Vitae

Alexander van der Meer was born in Ede, Gelderland, in 1989. He obtained a propaedeutic certificate in International Relations at the University of Groningen (2008–2009). Thereafter he completed a BA in History (cum laude) at Radboud University Nijmegen (2009–2012), and in parallel the Interdisciplinary Honours Programme, followed by an MA in Asia-Pacific Studies at National Chengchi University, Taipei (2012–2014), and the Master Politiek en Parlement (cum laude) at Radboud University (2015–2017).

From 2018 onwards he conducted his doctoral research at the Institute for History, Leiden University, on the colonial ideology of ministers and missionaries in Batavia (1700–1850). During the PhD he completed the basic and advanced training programme of the N.W. Posthumus Institute, and participated in conferences and masterclasses. He also undertook Indonesian (intermediate) language training at Sekolah Alam Bahasa (Yogyakarta). Since 2023 he has been a Lecturer at Leiden University, and taught at the Institute for History and at Leiden University College.
