Marieke Sophie Jansen was born on 19 November 1990 in Noordwijkerhout, the Netherlands. She completed her pre-university education (VWO) at Leeuwenhorst College, Noordwijkerhout (2002–2008) and attended a preparatory year at the Royal Academy of Art (KABK), The Hague (2008). She then studied psychology at Leiden University (2009–2012), completing her bachelor's degree in an accelerated 2.5-year program. Subsequently, she pursued medicine at Erasmus University Rotterdam, obtaining her bachelor's (2012–2015) and master's (2015–2019) degrees. During this time, she developed a strong interest in scientific research and epidemiological methods, taking additional electives in epidemiology.

After graduating in medicine, she worked as a physician–researcher at Erasmus Medical Centre (2019–2020), combining clinical work in the paediatric eczema outpatient clinic with research activities, including the design and ethical approval of a randomised controlled trial, participation as an investigator in an industry-sponsored trial, and patient data collection.

In 2021, she started her PhD at the Department of Clinical Epidemiology, Leiden University Medical Centre (LUMC), under the supervision of Prof. dr. Olaf M. Dekkers and Prof. dr. Rolf H.H. Groenwold. Her doctoral research addressed challenges in the quality of the evidence base for medical decision-making, spanning from study design, execution, and dissemination of results, to translation of evidence into decision-making. She presented her work at several national and international conferences, and published in peer-reviewed journals. During her PhD, she completed formal training as a clinical epidemiologist and contributed to teaching activities.

Currently, she works at the Department of Clinical Epidemiology, LUMC, within the Research Integrity team led by Prof. dr. Frits R. Rosendaal, focusing on improving the quality and integrity of medical research.
