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Curriculum Vitae

Ayodele Alabi was born on the 9th of August 1991, in Lagos, Nigeria. At the age of six, his parents moved with him to The Gambia. A persistent bowing of his legs as a young child, led to a chance conversation with a researcher at the Medical Research Council (MRC) in Fajara, The Gambia, which culminated in a successful surgical intervention in Dakar, Senegal. His surgery was largely funded by resources provided by researchers at the MRC Gambia. These early life experiences have influenced a third culture individual with high adaptability and an African worldview. They would also influence a eureka moment in his teenage years, during his secondary school studies at the West African International School in The Gambia, that affirmed his decision to pursue medical studies at university.

He obtained his Doctor of Medicine (MD) degree from the University of Medicine and Pharmacy of Craiova, Romania, in 2018, where he was given an award of excellence for outstanding performance and lasting contribution to the faculty of medicine. After graduating, he began his experience with the Centre de Recherches Médicales de Lambaréné (CERMEL), also in 2018, working in the research group of Prof. Selidji Agnandji.

In 2020, he was accepted into the PhD program at the LUMC, funded by a grant from the NWO- WOTRO Science for Global Development, and later by CERMEL via the European and Developing Countries Clinical Trials Partnership. In 2022, he became the clinical lead of the biomedical and social sciences research group at CERMEL. As part of his role, he leads and supervises the design of epidemiological studies, phase I-III clinical trials, and a controlled human infection model at CERMEL. Upon completing his PhD, he will begin a postdoctoral clinical fellowship at the Francis Crick Institute (the Crick) in London, the United Kingdom. His fellowship is co-funded by the Crick and the Rosetrees Trust. He plans to continue working on translationally impactful global health research, with focus on elucidating clinical and immune profiles within the African continent, and vaccine development.

Acknowledgements

I acknowledge the wonderful people that have contributed to my PhD journey, illustrating the uniqueness of each individual, by using an optical illusion that has fascinated me since the day I first saw one- a rainbow. Sunlight is made up of all the colours of the rainbow, and this is revealed when it is reflected by raindrops in the sky.
