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Abstract

This thesis interrogates the structural, symbolic, and affective dimensions of urban disadvantage in Zimbabwe's second city, Bulawayo. It positions disadvantage not as a static outcome but as a layered process produced through political settlements, spatial arrangements, historical trauma, and affective practices of survival and resistance. Drawing on political economy, memory studies, and futures thinking, the study examines how colonial legacies, ZANU-PF's post-independence political settlements, and the centralisation of power in Harare have entrenched Bulawayo's disadvantage, while also illuminating pathways for reimagining inclusive urban futures.

Anchored in Khan's political settlements framework, the analysis traces how elite bargaining, militarised governance, and patron-client networks have institutionalised disadvantage. These dynamics are compounded by ethno-political mythologies that cast Bulawayo as a "dissident city", legitimising state neglect and repression. Empirical chapters foreground how residents navigate disadvantage, as seen through urban survival strategies, informal economies, political silences, and affective practices of accumulation such as *ukubamba zonke*, thus revealing both structural constraints and resilient agency.

Methodologically, the research employs a case-centric process-tracing approach, complemented by futures methodologies including Causal Layered Analysis (CLA) and the Futures Triangle. This design moves beyond diagnosis to reimagination, envisioning "Bulawayo 2.0" as a justice-oriented, participatory, and resilient urban trajectory. Comparative insights from African cities further situate Bulawayo within wider continental patterns of shifting capitals, uneven development, and symbolic geographies of power.

By centring citizen narratives alongside historical and statistical analysis, the study contributes to African urban studies, political settlements theory, and futures scholarship. It argues for a decolonial and justice-oriented approach to urban governance that recognises disadvantage as simultaneously historical, contemporary, and prospective. Ultimately, Bulawayo is positioned not only as a site of disadvantage but also as a space of memory, myth, resilience, and possibility.
